#### Introduction

Parents, students, and educators are members of a team working together to create a learning environment that fosters the development of democratic ideals. This goal can best be accomplished by avoiding extremes of too much or too little discipline and by allowing the student to assume increasing responsibility for his/her individual behavior.

Every right has its limitations. The freedom of an individual or group to exercise rights stops when that exercise infringes upon the rights of others. Since the legitimate rights of individuals may be in conflict, it is necessary to recognize that rights must be balanced to protect as many persons as possible.

Teachers and students should promote tolerance for the views of others, as well as for the rights of an individual to form and hold different opinions and beliefs.

Each student has a right to an education. Discipline, as administered in the South Bend Community Schools in conjunction with the home, is designed to produce behavioral changes that will enable students to develop self-discipline. The major objectives of discipline in the schools are to teach the following fundamental concepts for living: (1) respect for the rights, dignity, and safety of all individuals within the school and community; (2) respect for law and observance of school corporation policies, procedures and local school regulations; and (3) respect for public and private property rights. Student behavior that unduly disrupts classwork, involves substantial disorder, or invades the rights of others or violates the law or local ordinance will not be tolerated.

Parents have the right to be informed of any disciplinary action implemented for their child. The teacher will make parent contact after dismissing a student from class. In the event that a conference between the administrator, parents, or teacher is necessary, every effort should be made to hold the conference within twenty-four (24) hours.

A student shall have access to, abide by, and be aware of, the rules, rights, and responsibilities to which he/she is subject. Introduction and orientation to the code shall be provided.

Questions or additional clarification may be directed to any teacher or building administrator. The entire text, including rights and responsibilities, is available in all school offices.

### ATTENDANCE AND TRUANCY

**Truancy/Unexcused absence** guidelines and consequences apply to student attendance **throughout** the school day. Truancy is any period of absence (all or any part of the day) which is not excused by parent/guardian. This <u>includes</u> attendance during any class and/or lunch.

# STATEMENT

Excessive absence places a student in danger of failing a course or repeating a grade. Unexcused absences and truancies, resulting in a total of 8 days or more per semester, will be a significant factor in recommending retention. After 8 days per semester, a physician's excuse is required.

### GENERAL SCHOOL CONDUCT

General school conduct guidelines apply to student conduct **throughout** the school day on school grounds before and after school hours, during travel to and from school and at all school sponsored activities (including summer school).

- Engaging, on or off school grounds, in any unlawful activity that constitutes an interference with school purposes or an educational function.
- Aiding, assisting, or conspiring with another person to violate student conduct rules or state or federal law.
- Violating a school rule, and/or a state or federal law.

### **DEFINITION OF TERMS**

# After School Detention (ASD):

The student remains after school in an assigned detention area and will be given classroom assignments to complete.

### **Authorized School District Personnel:**

Paid personnel of the South Bend Community School Corporation, volunteers, and student teachers.

# **Due Process:**

Due process of law will be provided to students in all discipline matters. This includes the opportunity to be informed of the provisions of the code or other school regulations or procedures allegedly violated together with evidence to support the charge. Students will be given an opportunity to respond. Any student recommended for expulsion shall be entitled to have the legal procedures provided by law followed prior to any decision being made as to that expulsion.

### **Expulsion:**

Denial of the right to attend school for a certain time period.

# Out-of-School Suspension (OSS):

Temporary denial by the school administration of the right to attend class or activities. (Maximum of five school days).

# **PRIMARY** STUDENT CODE **OF CONDUCT**



# Scope of Code

This code applies to all students in the **Primary Center**. Specific action may be administered in the order shown or may be determined by the severity or repetitiveness of the act involved. School administrators shall have the right to implement any of the described consequences without respect to the order in which they are listed. If a student is found to have acted inappropriately it is generally expected that at least one consequence will be imposed. All administrators shall have the right to utilize additional consequences as they deem appropriate.

THE CONSEQUENCES LISTED FOR EACH OFFENSE SHALL SERVE AS A GUIDE TO THE ADMINISTRATOR IN DETERMINING THE APPROPRIATE DISCIPLINE ACTION.
